This Gospel reading is disturbing. After doing a lot of hard work, the last thing we want to hear from God is: "You're an unprofitable servant."

Think of how hard you work. Whether it's at home or for a business or in ministry, we're never rewarded enough, right? Instead, we're given more work! At home, we try to relax after a busy day but

one of the kids or an elderly relative needs help. On the job, we're given more work because our colleagues are either too lazy or they've been laid off. In the parish, most of the work gets done by only 10 to 20% of the people.

Jesus says that our reaction to all this should be: "Lord, I'm an unworthy servant of your kingdom, because I've only done what's expected of me." Is he implying that it's right to

be burdened with more to do when we're tired? Not at all! What he is telling us is that there's a difference between doing what's required out of mere obedience and volunteering to go the extra mile because we love and we care.

When we stop short of going the extra mile, it's usually because we have an unbalanced view of faith. Unaware that we're serving Christ in our everyday tasks, and unaware that we're serving others with Christ, we settle for a mediocre, half-hearted attitude. We limit our potential.

And then we're astonished that Jesus would suggest that we can command

trees to cast themselves into the sea! When was the last time you saw that happen?

Here's the connection between doing more than the minimum and having a supernatural faith: For both to occur, we have to know that God's love is complete and unconditional and available all the time and that from this comes his desire to serve us.

Knowing this, we're confident that he can accomplish anything he wants in us and through us. If we care like he cares, we want to go the extra mile with him. And then when we get hurt or tired, he restores us. Do you believe that yet?



#### Reflect & Discuss:

- VVhat's your mulberry tree? VVhat problem is so deeply rooted that it seems immoveable?
- VVho in your life is so stuck in sin that you've lost hope? Can you surprise that person with gestures of love that are unexpected and unrequested?
- 3. Describe examples of service that show the difference between doing our duty and doing more. How does volunteering to serve above and beyond what's expected reveal God's love?

# Called to Serve Moms in Need



Our Blessed Mother models a profound witness to love and life in the Gospel account of the Visitation. Luke's Gospel tells us that, when Mary learns that her cousin Elizabeth is pregnant, she travels to the hill country "in haste" (Lk 1:39). Despite being unexpectedly pregnant herself, Mary responds to this news with urgency.

She embarks on a long and perhaps difficult journey to be with her cousin during her time of need, bearing Christ to her as He lay quietly hidden in Mary's womb. And, although Jesus is veiled from view, when Mary first arrives John the Baptist leaps for joy in Elizabeth's womb, recognizing the presence of Christ (Lk 1:44). Mary, with Jesus, spends the next three months at Elizabeth's side.

The witness of our Blessed Mother invites us to become more aware of the needs of pregnant and parenting moms in our own parishes and communities. A woman with an unexpected pregnancy may have any number of fears and challenges: facing judgment from her friends and family, losing her job or housing, or being abandoned by the father of her child.

Following Mary's example, we can ask ourselves how to better know these mothers, listen to them, seek understanding, and help them obtain the necessities of life for themselves and their children. How can we, like the Blessed Mother, lovingly support mothers in welcoming and caring for God's gift of life?

Throughout the whole of Scripture, Mary's words are few. Yet, in her sacred encounter with Elizabeth, a powerful declaration pours from her lips. Mary proclaims to all generations that the Lord *lifts up the lowly, fills the hungry with good things*, and remembers his promise of mercy from age to age (Lk 1:46-56). In both word and deed, Mary speaks a

My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord; my spirit rejoices in God my savior.

Luke 1:46-47

message of *hope*—not only to Elizabeth, but also to every mother in need and to each of us.

Mary's witness is an invitation to step out in love and compassion. It is a summons to *make haste* to help vulnerable women who may be isolated and alone. By doing so, we too can bear Christ within us and help others experience His presence.

Inspired by the Blessed Mother's example and guided by the Holy Spirit, may we offer Christ's presence and love to mothers in their time of need through our faithful service and support.

#### **Current Initiatives**

#### 1. Mental Health

- a. Affordable Counseling at the Diocese of Alexandria and No Limits for Recovery Clubhouse. Payment is determined from a sliding scale. Starting October 1, 2022 appointments/payments will be made on the website.
- b. Support Groups will be offered starting September 29, 2022. The first support group will be for Divorce Recovery. The group is 9 sessions long and is open to the first 15 individuals that register. The cost is \$50.00. Register on the website.
- c. Three master level social work interns from accredited universities will assist groups and provide supervised counseling.

#### 2. Disaster Relief

- a. CCCL is on the Long-Term Recovery Group (LTRG) for Central Louisiana. The LTRG consists of a community-based board, with four organizations bringing funds to the table. The group meets monthly to hear cases presented by FEMA Disaster Case Management Program employees and vote on how to assist persons whose homes were affected by Hurricane Laura. CCCL received \$130,000 of disaster relief monies from CCUSA and has paid approximately \$30,000 towards making homes safe and livable.
- b. Central Louisiana Emergency Response Coalition (CLERC) is a group of community partners interested in disaster relief who have recently come together to preemptively address disaster relief needs. A storage location has been established and coalition members are in the process of collecting bottled water, non-perishable food boxes and tarps, for immediate distribution after a disaster strikes. Our Catholic schools will be assisting us in the initial Warehouse Project drive during the month of September.

#### 3. Basic Needs

- a. CCCL is supporting two food pantries (St. Francis of Assisi in Waterproof and No Limits for Recovery Clubhouse in Alexandria). Support for both pantries was made possible by a Grant from the Central Louisiana Community Foundation and donations from our first fundraiser. Total monies given in support is \$4000.
- b. CCCL will be trained to be a community partner to help low-income clients register for the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP). CCUSA gave CCCL a \$17,000 grant for the program. Training for SNAP is on September 14, 2022. CCCL has three partners (St. Francis of Assisi in Waterproof, St. Juliana in Alexandria, and No Limits for Recovery in Alexandria) that will receive a percentage of the grant and training. CCCL

has a fourth spot in Colfax at First Baptist Church where interns will assist with enrollment. The future location will be at Jacob's Well, an inter-agency collaboration to set up a one stop site for basic needs assistance in Central LA. Infrastructure is underway and grants are being scouted to get this program launched by January 2023.

- c. Finance classes will be offered to clients as a condition for them to receive financial assistance from CCCL. Several Financial Coaches have agreed to teach money management and budgeting once a week at No Limits 4 Recovery Clubhouse with a potential second location at the Diocese of Alexandria Conference Room.
- d. Interns will work as case managers to help clients receive the best care possible. If CCCL is unable to help, the interns will be able to refer them to partner agencies with needed resources.

- 4. BC/BS Collective Impact Grant for Warehouse Project. Letter of intent due 12/1/22. Project must be selected to apply for full grant.
