The Reception of Holy Communion at Mass The return of Receiving the Precious Blood of the Risen Lord from the Chalice

In the Gospel of Matthew, at the Last Supper, Jesus told his disciples "Take and eat; 'this is my body.' Then he took a cup, gave thanks and gave it to them, 'Drink from it, all of you, for this is my blood of the covenant, which will be shed on behalf of many for the forgiveness of sins." From the first days of the Church's celebration of the Eucharist, Holy Communion consisted of the reception of both species in fulfillment of the Lord's command to "take and eat...take and drink." The distribution of Holy Communion to the faithful under both kinds was thus the norm for more than a millennium of Catholic liturgical practice. (Norms for the Distribution and Reception of Holy Communion). Because of the concerns about sharing from the chalice during the COVID pandemic, the Diocese of Alexandria, like so many others, placed a moratorium on its distribution to the assembly. It has remained only for the clergy to receive from the chalice as they are obligated (for validity) to receive under both species at every Mass. On February 7th, Bishop Marshall announced to the priests his plan to authorize Communion under both species beginning at the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday, April 6, 2023. The decision to return the chalice is at the discretion of each pastor after he assesses the availablility of Extraordinary Ministers of the Holy Communion to assist in the distribution of the Eucharist.

Proper Reception of the Body and Blood of Christ:

As Catholics, we fully participate in the celebration of the Eucharist when we receive Holy Communion. We are encouraged to receive Communion devoutly and frequently. In order to be properly disposed to receive Communion, participants should not be conscious of grave sin and normally should have fasted for one hour. A person who is conscious of grave sin is not to receive the Body and Blood of the Lord without prior sacramental confession except for a grave reason where there is no opportunity for confession. In this case, the person is to be mindful of the obligation to make an act of perfect contrition, including the intention of confessing as soon as possible (canon 916). A frequent reception of the Sacrament of Penance is encouraged for all. (USCCB: Guidelines for the Reception of Communion)

Body:

To properly receive, one should approach the minister in a standing position (normative way) or you can kneel, regardless you should offer a slight bow and either receive on the hand or the tongue. When the minister says "The Body of Christ" you reply audibly, "Amen". If receiving on the hand, you should place your dominant hand under your other and create a space where the minister can safely place the Body of our Lord. One should refrain from any other way of placing their hands. One should also never take the host from the minister. The body of Christ is given to us, its not something we take. If you choose to receive on the tongue, generously project your tongue forward to allow the minister to place our Lord safely on your tongue. An audible "Amen" is to be said as well when the minister says "The Body of Christ".

Blood:

To properly receive, one should approach the minister in a standing position and when the minister raises the cup and says "The Blood of Christ", audibly say "Amen", reverently receive the cup, take a sip and hand it back to the minister.

FAQ's about reception of the Precious Body and Blood of our Lord

1. Must I receive from the Chalice? No. The opportunity to partake of the Precious Blood of Christ in the chalice is always a choice of the communicant.

2. If I only receive the Consecrated Host and not the Precious Blood, do I lessen the reception of Communion? No. The real presence of Christ, Body and Blood, is fully present when one receives the Body of our Lord. As stated in the Norms for the Distribution and Reception of Holy Communion, "the real presence of Christ in the Eucharistic elements, whole and entire-in each of consecrated bread and wine under the Doctrine of Concomitance which states that since Christ is indivisible, no part of Christ's substance can be divided." The General Instruction of the Roman Missal #281, however does state that Holy Communion has a fuller form as a sign when it takes place under both kinds.

3. Is it possible for me to just "dip" the Consecrated Host into the Chalice of Precious Blood? No. The normative way to receive of the Precious Blood of the Lord is by taking a small sip from the cup. What you are referring to is what's called "Intinction". If the practice of Intinction occurs, it can ONLY be done by a Bishop or Priest. It is never permitted for individuals to intinct on their own.

4. Is it safe to receive from the Chalice? As always, it does carry some risk but the risk of infectious disease transmission remains low when proper safeguards are maintained. At the same time if one is sick, presumed to be sick or simply not feeling well, one should refrain from receiving from the chalice.

5. Why aren't individual cups used? The Lord himself gave us the Eucharist at the Last Supper. The eucharistic sacrifice "is wholly directed toward the intimate union of the faithful with Christ through communion." (NDHC #6). This is made visible in the sharing of the one cup which remains more faithful to the command and action of our Lord at the Last Supper.

6. What if I am not able to receive Communion? Any who are not receiving Holy Communion are encouraged to express in their hearts a prayerful desire for unity with the Lord Jesus and one another. (USCCB: Guidelines for the Reception of Communion)

7. Can I receive Communion more than once a day? As canon 917 states, "A person who has already received the Most Holy Eucharist can receive it a second time on the same day only within the eucharistic celebration in which the person participates, without prejudice to the prescript." The current interpretation is that a person may receive Holy Communion twice if they have participated in two Masses on the same day.

"May the receiving of your Body and Blood, Lord Jesus Christ, not bring me to judgement and condemnation, but through your loving mercy be for me protection of mind and body and a healing remedy." (Priest's prayer before reception of Holy Communion- Roman Missal)

Saturday April 15 Acts 4:13-21 Ps 118:1,14-15b,16-21 Mark 16:9-15 Are you ready to proclaim the Good News about how Jesus has helped you? What holds you back? Do you hesitate because you don't yet understand how the deaths in your life (the sacrifices, the lost hope, the broken relationships, etc.) have been resurrected into new life?

Such hesitation was the mental state of the disciples on the first Easter morning, as depicted in the Gospel of John.

The attitude of Peter in the reading from Acts is quite a contrast! The disciples now know their calling: They were empowered and commissioned to testify that Jesus is the Savior, and they fully embraced this vocation.

Do you understand how Jesus is turning your tragedies and other difficulties into triumphs and great blessings?

To "testify" means to share the truth based on your own experiences. Peter specifically proclaimed that everyone who believes in Jesus receives forgiveness of sins. Of course he did! Peter knew first-hand what it's like to need and then receive Christ's forgiveness.

We will not understand much about how our sufferings have led us to a new and blessed life until we start talking about it. The first inklings of insight awaken when we discuss it within our close, holy friendships, like Mary of Magdala did when she ran to Peter and John after discovering the empty tomb. They, in turn, told the other disciples.

It was while they were together – in community – that Jesus appeared and revealed his resurrection to them. Later, after having lots of time to talk about it with friends, the Holy Spirit



empowered them to go out and evangelize the world by sharing their experiences with anyone willing to listen.

Reflect & Discuss:

- The empty tomb doesn't immediately make sense. What has been confusing to you during your faith journey? What has caused you to feel empty and frightened? Where might Jesus be in this?
- How have your own experiences of being forgiven enabled you to feel more compassionate toward others? Does that change the way you talk to them about God and church and other spiritual or moral issues?
- What is the biggest change that Jesus has brought into your life? What were you like before this change? How did God intervene? What were the results? This is your testimony. Practice sharing it by telling the story to your community of friends.

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The Divine Mercy Sunday Indulgence

What is an indulgence?

"An indulgence is a remission before God of the temporal punishment due to sins whose guilt has already been forgiven, which the faithful Christian who is duly disposed gains under certain prescribed conditions through the action of the Church which, as the minister of redemption, dispenses and applies with authority the treasury of the satisfactions of Christ and the saints."

"An indulgence is partial or plenary according as it removes either part or all of the temporal punishment due to sin." The faithful can gain indulgences for themselves or apply them to the dead.

Catechism of the Catholic Church 1478-1479

What are the conditions for a plenary indulgence?

- Sacramental confession (within about 20 days before or after)
- Eucharistic communion (preferably on the day, or the days before or after)
- Prayer for the pope's intentions

What are the specific conditions for the Divine Mercy Sunday indulgence?


- On Divine Mercy Sunday, in any church or chapel, in a spirit that is completely detached from the affection for a sin, even a venial sin, take part in the prayers and devotions held in honor of Divine Mercy.
- Or, in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament exposed or reserved in the tabernacle, recite the Our Father and the Creed, adding a devout prayer to the merciful Lord Jesus (e.g. "Merciful Jesus, I trust in you.").
- A partial indulgence is granted to the faithful who, at least with a contrite heart, pray to the merciful Lord Jesus.

The message of the Divine Mercy is simple. It is that God loves us – all of us. And, he wants us to recognize that his mercy is greater than our sins, so that we will call upon him with trust, receive his mercy, and let it flow through us to others. Thus, all will come to share his joy.

The Divine Mercy message is one we can call to mind simply by remembering ABC:

A: Ask for his mercy. God wants us to approach him in prayer constantly, repenting of our sins and asking him to pour his mercy out upon us and upon the whole world.

B: Be merciful. God wants us to receive his mercy and let it flow through us to others. He wants us to extend love



and forgiveness to others just as he does to us.

C: Completely trust in Jesus. God wants us to know that the graces of his mercy are dependent upon our trust. The more we trust in Jesus, the more we will receive.

This message and devotion to Jesus as the Divine Mercy is based on the writings of St. Faustina Kowalska, an uneducated Polish nun who, in obedience to her spiritual director, wrote a diary of about 600 pages recording the revelations she received about God's mercy. Even before her death in 1938, the devotion to the Divine Mercy had begun to spread. Learn more at <u>thedivinemercy.org</u>.
